The pool is open and residents' guests, children and grandchildren will be sharing the Coast Village amenities with other residents. It is always great to meet family and friends of our residents, and enjoy the laughter and the energy of the summer season, so WELCOME family and guests. As residents, please be aware that there could be young children in the streets so please slow down and be extra watchful driving through Coast Village in these summer months.

Now, for the special interest part of this announcement: When hosting friends or family, it is your responsibility as a resident to ensure that your guests are informed of, and follow, the Coast Village rules including those pertaining to speed limit, clubhouse and pools, fireworks, skate boarding in public areas, firearms, etc. Let's face it, kids will be kids and we love to see that young energy in our community; however, if you see an unaccompanied young person, or guest, causing damage or breaking the rules to where they are disruptive to other residents and you are uncomfortable approaching them, or they become argumentative, please report the incident immediately to the office staff. If the office is closed, feel free to call the POM or e-mail her at pom@cvpoc.com or leave a message on the office phone, fill out a complaint form, or inform the staff when the office reopens. Please do not call outside normal working hours (8-4M-F) to report a non-urgent issue. In the event that the guest's behavior could cause harm or property damage and you cannot contact (or are uncomfortable contacting) the hosting resident, report the behavior to the office immediately during open hours, or contact the police if the issue is an emergency.

Remember the pool rules:

No jumping, running on the pool deck. No glass containers pool side. Hours are as follows:
9:00 a.m.—8:30 p.m.

Adult only on Tuesdays and Thursdays until 1:00 p.m.

All other times are open to all.

The pool cannot be reserved for private pool parties however the Rose Room can and those guests would be able to utilize the pool during open times.

RECIPE CORNER

Potato Salad with Artichokes, Feta Cheese & Olive Relish

Ingredients:

5 Tbs. (2 1/2 fl. oz./75 ml) olive oil
2 1/2 Tbs. white wine vinegar
1 large garlic clove, minced
1 1/2 tsp. dried oregano
Salt and freshly ground pepper
6 large Greek or Sicilian green olives, pitted and chopped
6 to 8 brine-cured black Mediterranean olives, pitted and chopped
1/2 cup (2 1/2 oz./75 g) chopped fennel
3 large green onions, including green portion, chopped
12 small multicolored potatoes (about 2 1/2 lb./1.25 kg total weight)
1 can (14 oz./440 g) quartered artichoke hearts in water
5 oz. (155 g) feta cheese, coarsely crumbled

Directions:

To make the olive relish, in a bowl, whisk together the oil, vinegar, garlic, oregano and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Stir in the olives, fennel and two-thirds of the green onions.

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add the potatoes and cook until tender when pierced with a small knife, about 25 minutes. Drain and let stand until cool to the touch, about 20 minutes. Cut the potatoes in half, then transfer to a large bowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste. Add the artichokes and olive relish. Toss to blend. Stir in most of the cheese, reserving some for sprinkling on top.

Sprinkle the remaining green onions and the remaining cheese over the salad and serve immediately. Serves 4 to 6.



REMEMBER, if you want to have a fire in your fire pit use these guidelines:

- ALWAYS have a hose hooked up and nearby while enjoying your fire.

Currently wood fire pits are okay to use, but do not burn garbage, leaf debris or limbs with needles or leaves because they can cause sparks to fly and create a fire elsewhere. If you can use a fire screen.

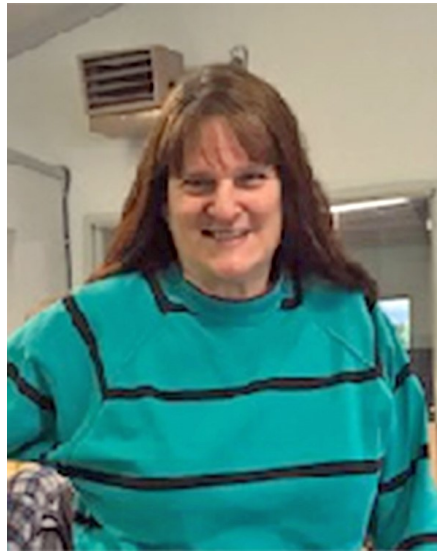

Happy June!

Not to start off with “don’t do this” stuff but there are a few reminders I feel I need to cover.

Please, keep your dogs inside your fence or on a leash!

Please do NOT park in other people’s lots when they are not in residence.

Please, do NOT throw lit cigarette butts out your window while driving on the street.

Please do not leave dirty dishes in the sink for others to clean up.

Please TURN OFF the oven after use.

Please pick up your dog waste!

Now to more positive information.

I know some of you have felt frustrated by the laundry machines being down. We are trying our best to find someone to repair them, we had someone hired but they have not worked out. We will be replacing a dryer sometime next month.

As reported in the May Newsletter our water project is finished, our #1 pump station is finished (we will be adding some protective posts in front of it). Our roads have been repaired. This is where our Reserve Fund helps us. For those that are new, Coast Village deposits \$75,000.00 per year from our dues into that account. We have had some spends this year on sewer issues, and the pump station that were not planned. But we had the money in the Reserve to address those issues.

We still have a very few road issues but will be using quick patch to keep up with those. Remember if you have an area you would like us to address, we may have missed something! Let us know.

Some lot owners have requested information on weed burning:

No Weed Burning City code 6-1-4-5: No person shall ignite, attempt to ignite, kindle, maintain or allow to be maintained the following fires: (Ord. 15, 2011) E) A fire for the purpose of burning grass, hay or straw, tree limbs and trimmings. This includes burning weeds in your yard and concrete.

I have had numerous requests over the last few years about the lack of use of the volley ball court. We have little to no interest in resurrecting it and quite frankly with all of the weeds that produce burrs the sandy area has become a problem as the noxious weed is spreading. We do not spray in Coast Village with defoliation type sprays. We have each year been digging up and remov-



Question of the Month!

When do I need to submit an ARC Fence Request?

Every fence or gate needs to be submitted to the ARC, which evaluates the project. If the ARC approves the project, it is then submitted to the Board of Directors for approval. Only after the BOD has approved the project may it be installed.

The CC&Rs state: 5.13 Fences: No fence, gate or similar structure may be constructed or placed on any Lot without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors and Architectural Review Committee.

This includes dog containment fences, temporary fences, driveway gates, etc.

Fence repairs will generally need approval as well. Very minor repairs that do not change any characteristics of the fence do not. But anything major that might be construed as a “new” fence would be best to submit an application.

Any repairs to a property line fence needs approval as it is in the greenbelt and is subject to a different level of conditions.

Bottom line: if you are installing any kind of fence or gate, fill out a fence request form. Better to not need approval than get a fine.

ing as much as we can but it has developed into quite a problem area. Because of that, and the requests for a picnic area out there we will be moving forward by placing concrete patio tiles down. This will help with the weed issue, this will also give us a nice area to set on a picnic table and have lunch or visit, etc. If the area is well used we can look at placing a gazebo there next year. We will be leaving the horseshoe pit, basket ball area and Tetherball pole intact. We may be building a small fire pit for people to use, that's still up in the air.

The heater in the men's bathroom at the satellite bath is not working, I will replace it soon but it will be set up in a different way (explanation below). The weather is warming now so hopefully it won't be too much of an inconvenience for very long.

I am researching better options for the heating in our bathrooms and clubhouse. Our light bill can run in winter over \$1500.00 per month. Most of this is generated by the garage type heaters being used. My plan is to change how these heaters are run. Often, especially in the bathrooms, members use something to turn up the heat when they shower, then they leave but have no means to turn the heaters down. That keeps heaters running full out for hours without anyone being in the bathrooms. I am going to be placing timers on the heaters and taking away the ability to turn them up on high. This way they will heat when the timer is turned on and stay running for 30 minutes. That should give people time to shower and if they need additional time they can turn the timer on for another 30 minutes. Hopefully this will reduce costs tremendously.

Because the population in our community has changed to a larger percentage of full time members our garbage has also increased substantially. I need to find ways to cut costs in other areas to offset some of these increases.

I will be taking a week off at the end of June for replacement hip surgery. I will be working at home for a week after that. Nancy will be holding down the fort and I will be available by phone.

I encourage everyone to be patient. We have a great support staff here at Coast Village.

A reminder to everyone that the Annual Meeting is coming in July. Especially "new owners" - it's important to turn out and be a part of the management and rules. This is when you have your say. Consider running for a BOD position, the cut-off date for application is June 10th.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE 2021-2022

I wanted to share with the community a brief synopsis of what to expect when we gather for the annual meeting. This way if there are concerns or questions you can be prepared and ask questions.

First and foremost I wish to thank our POM, Carlla Vande Vyver for her astute assessment of costs and projections of costs, thus protecting our Reserve accounts adequately. It's a big job and we are fortunate to have Carlla and the Financial Committee that feels committed and passionate about keeping CV successfully functioning.

During the last 3-4 years we have experienced significant increases in the financial cost of living, food, gasoline, propane, garbage and brush disposal, cleaning supplies, contracted labor, employee costs and other operational expenses. I do not believe when projecting costs, any of us could have anticipated the changes in our general cost of maintaining a large community like Coast Village and the enormous impact of the current inflation rates.

Currently we are finishing up the 2022-2023 projections and happily it does not appear that we will need to raise the dues which is a huge success for everyone.

The projected Reserve Funds for the year 2022-2023 will begin with a balance of \$104,730.63 and then there is the usual fund transfer of \$75,000.00 bringing the total reserve account up to \$179,703.63 for the year, which is very satisfactory. At this time we have no "big" planned spending scheduled for the upcoming 2022/2023 Fiscal Year.

Of course we always want "more in Reserve", but with the unplanned spending this current fiscal year we all feel very positive that we have made it through this time as well as we have. The costs we incurred over planned spending this 2021-2022 fiscal year included:

1. Pump Station #1 replacement at a total cost of \$35,024.00 (Emergent situation)
2. #4 pump station major repair at a total cost of \$6,000.00
3. Laundry room and post office repair of which our part as Coast Village was \$27,000 to re-side the compromised siding for the rest of the building (the other work was covered by insurance) this was fixed because of the additional rebuild to the post office due to an accident with a vehicle. We have also had some unplanned costs to keep our security systems functioning appropriately which included running some new cables. We currently will have security cabling which needs replaced at the entrance. This will be a "planned" expenditure for the coming fiscal year.

That we were able to accommodate these unforeseen costs and still come out financially intact was amazing and primarily to the POM's ability to negotiate costs with private contractors and to spread cost out over the year. Here's hoping the next five years of Reserve spending will be equally productive and manageable for our community.

See you at the annual meeting in July—don't forget our declaration of candidacy is June 10 and we need people to step up to fulfill the 3 open positions for board directors and when I say "we need" I mean **YOU**, **me** and **everyone** needs to step up to help themselves as well as the community.

NEWS FROM THE ARC

Summer is really just at our doorstep now! Along with friends returning, guests visiting, outdoor activities, comes the biggie of the summer... Fire season.

Folks are worried and concerned; the last several years of extreme drought coupled with high winds, and careless actions, led to massive wildfires in Oregon. While we are currently NOT in drought in our area, we must continue to be vigilant with fire safety.

CURRENTLY, we can have a cooking or warming fires here in Coast Village. The Si-uslaw Fire & Rescue website says, "Outdoor recreation fire used for cooking with fire in a fireplace, barbecue set; or an outdoor fire ring or pit fueled with cut and split firewood." and "Recreation fire in an approved campsite in fire pits provided and fueled with cut and split firewood." ARE PERMITTED. Normal precautions should be taken when having an outdoor fire (even if it's in a fire pit/fire ring). The Si-uslaw Fire Department recommends having a water source nearby (a hose with a spray nozzle, or watering can) to put out a fire in an emergency situation.

Open burning is defined as the burning of any matter in such a manner that the products of combustion resulting from the burning are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or flue.

THERE IS NO OPEN BURNING WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF FLORENCE.

Here are Coast Village's rules regarding fire and burning:

Each lot owner may have and operate a barbecue or fireplace of ordinary domestic proportions. No fire shall be left unattended at any time.

All barbecue and fireplace areas shall have sufficient clearance from vegetation and other combustible material to prevent any escape of fire.

All fires shall be conducted in the approximate center of a fireproof platform constructed of concrete or of sand and gravel of a depth of not less than six (6) inches and extending not less than four (4) feet tall in all directions of an active fire.

As of the date of the writing of this article, (May 25) we are permitted to have our fire (s) as listed above. This could change at any time. The fire department will let us know if/when there will be fire restrictions.

Until then, please use good judgement, have fun, and enjoy your campfires!

Please remember to keep watering your greenbelts! These dry days feel great to us, but our water-loving plants don't like them too much... the sand dries out rapidly, GETS

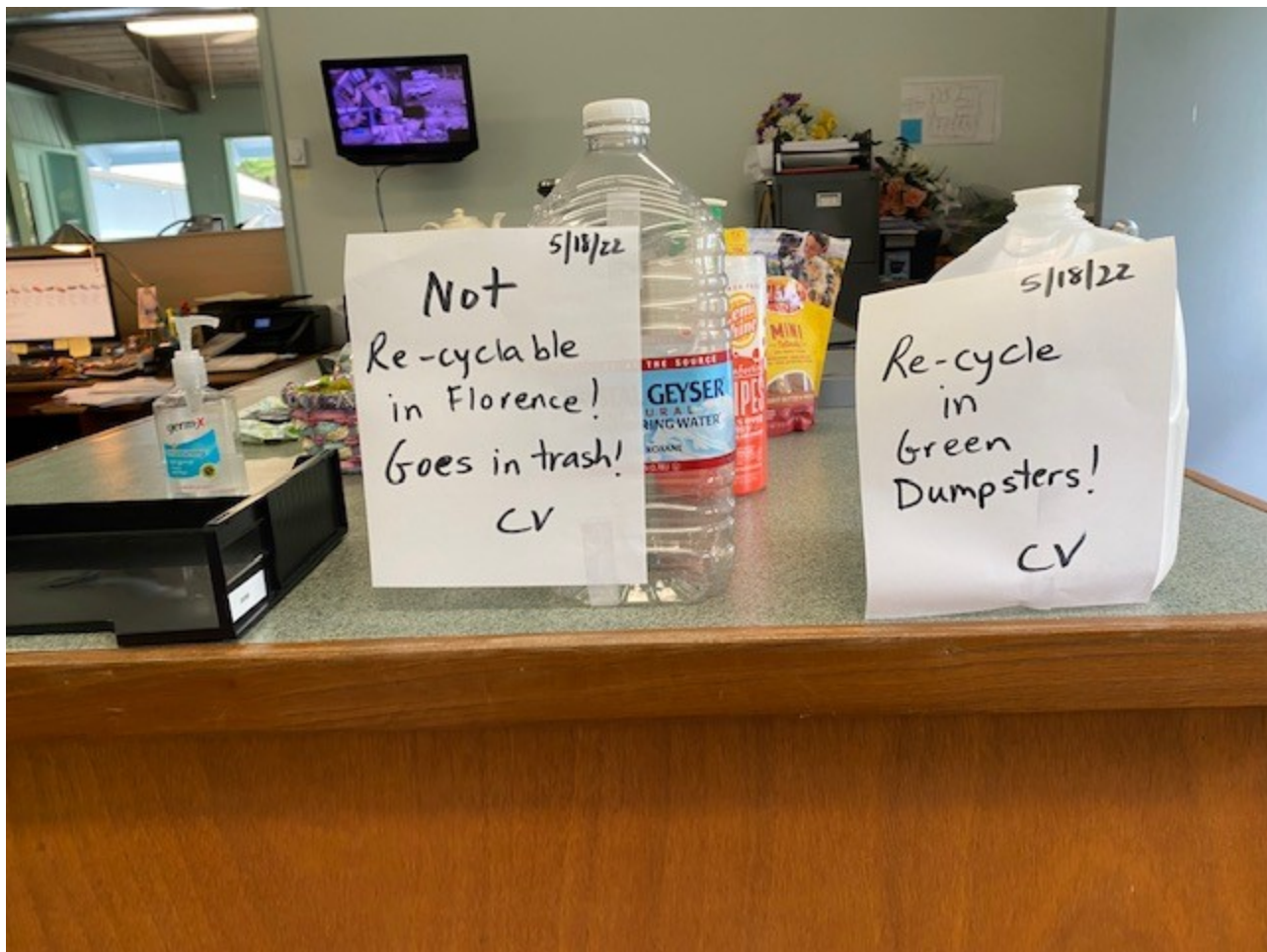

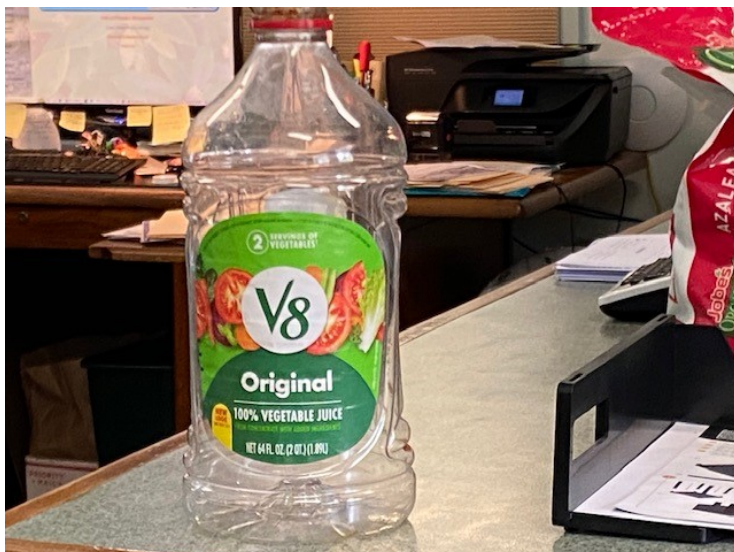

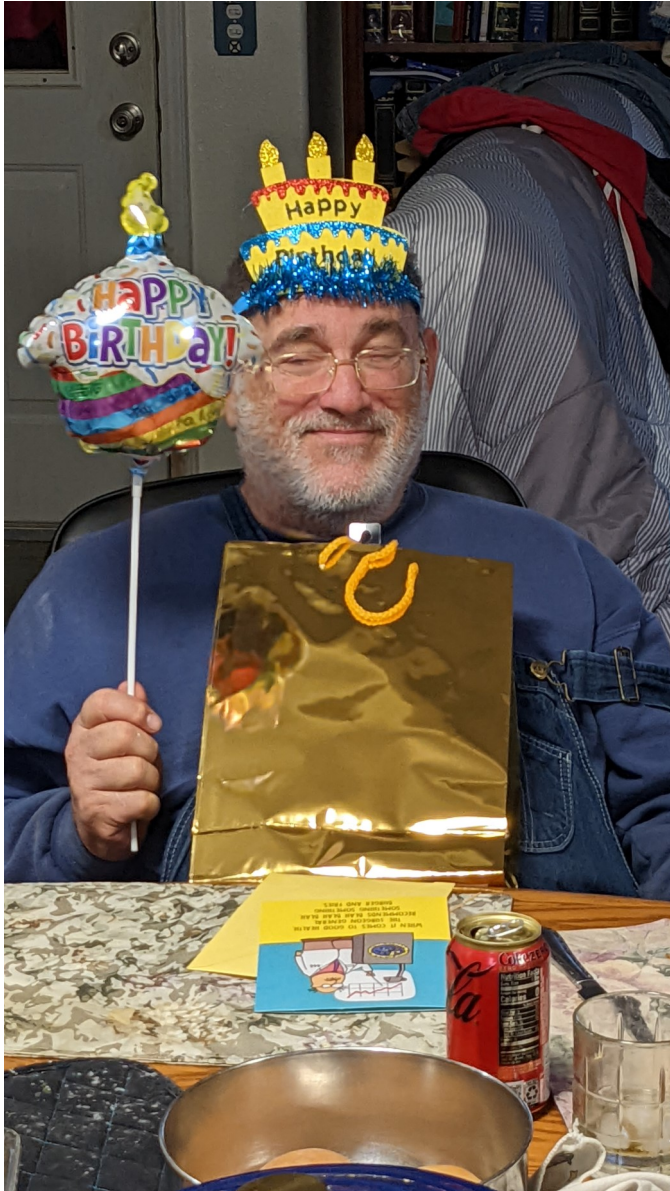
