It's important to remember that many of these plants, including the native rhodys, are fine being in full sun but Only if they are getting enough water. Take away enough water and only those in the shade of large trees are going to survive.

Too much sun + no water = dead plants.

Plenty of shade + no water = sad plants.

Let's hope for lots of rain in September and even more in October (to bring the Coho into Siltcoos/Tahkenitch) but until then, take a look

IS IT ANGER OR IS IT FEAR? Personal thoughts~Dory Hethcote

Typically, we experience a primary emotion like fear, loss, or sadness first. Because these emotions create feelings of vulnerability and loss of control, they make us uncomfortable. One way of attempting to deal with these feelings is by subconsciously shifting into anger. Anger is only helpful as a temporary catalyst to realizing that you have a problem and may help solve the initial dilemma but is destructive if prolonged and your primary emotion in conflict.

I have been thinking of the unrelenting feelings of discontent and anger I see in our own community as they reflect the global angst, fear, and anger we encounter daily. Helplessness to prevent or change events (like the Lahaina fire) along with the anger, and pain, and for many of us gives us a sense of immediacy to “do something to make it better” to find someone or something to blame in order to manage our sense of impotence. The only way for me to find some sense of peace is to realize that I am **angry** and need to blame someone or something for my fears (of abandonment, bills piling up, not enough food, etc.) in order to not feel my fear which is the driving emotion.

Our need to assign blame keeps us distracted from those emotions we are uncomfortable with. I personally feel blame is a wasted emotion, it signifies feeling powerless and assigns “accountability for the problem” to someone or something outside of ourselves and never have to feel that we somehow were a part of the issue. Most often we are a part of the issue...**Anger** makes us feel powerful and distracts us from the fear of our loss of control over our well-being and lives. I want to encourage all of us to re-evaluate our anger into a question. **Why is this upsetting me?** Is it more **“fear-based” than “anger-based”**?

It feels safer to assign blame and so much harder and scarier to acknowledge why you feel threatened by something and were unable to pursue a resolution to the problem.

I have felt and done all of these things I am talking about and have a personal history of ignoring my fear and resorting to anger because it felt safer to me...I do not think it ever was very successful or rewarding.

WAYS TO COPE WITH FEAR

1. Identify what is the real issue you are struggling with
2. Share this with a friend, family, or therapist with the caveat that you are not asking them to fix it for you
3. Journal or write down your feelings and explore ways to resolve the issue/ or not and just the act of writing it down can help
4. Identify small manageable steps to improving your feelings and situation
5. If the upset or discord is between neighbors ask to meet over tea, or just a brief sit down to see if any way to resolve things
6. Sometimes there is no resolution and we can choose to move on and pursue our lives or stay stuck in anger

If you trade your authenticity for safety, you may experience the following: anxiety, depression, eating disorders, addiction, rage, blame, resentment, and inexplicable grief.

We are still looking for some more people to be on the activity committee for helping out.

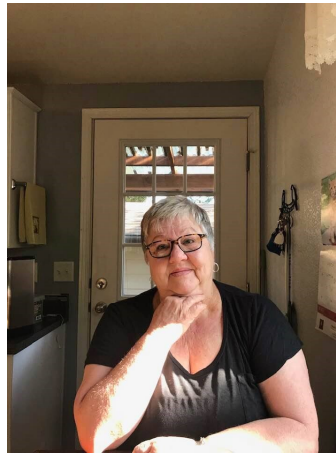

Wow! It's September! Our children are back home from visits, their children are back in school.

My family just visited from Arkansas and I know many others have had family visiting for the summer. It was fun, and tiring ha ha.



The days are becoming a bit cooler, almost time to start planting some new plants in your greenbelt. I have been visiting various lots discussing greenbelt restoration and plants. There are several lots that are cleaning up dead debris and starting to add drought resistant plants. The Rhododendrons seem to be really suffering this year, I hope everyone is getting ready to use some fertilizer and are watering. Remember we have fertilizer in the office for our greenbelts which is the type that is excellent for Rhododendrons. Please stop by and pick up a bag. It's paid for out of the greenbelt fund. It's very important if you are "trimming" dead or diseased plants that you salvage every plant you can. "Trimming" does not mean clearcutting your greenbelt and lot. Of course the interior of your lot is up to you, but the greenbelt must remain or be immediately replanted if you remove a plant.

We had some damage to the plants in the front of Coast Village by the entrance, it is looking a bit bare but we are waiting for a bit cooler weather to plant. Many of you have voiced dismay over the ground cover die-out we will be replanting and also adding some Escallonia instead of the Rhododendrons.

A good fertilizer containing sulfur is good for Rhody plants.

There have been some electrical issues with pump stations that we are in the process of fixing. We also had a pump jammed up from what appeared to be a diaper of some sort. We were able to clear it and the pump was not damaged.

Remember, do NOT flush wipes, diapers, pads down your toilets. This will often cause issues with the pump stations. We are also continuing to see a lot of fats in the tanks. Please, even if I sound like a broken record, do not flush grease down the sinks.

Coast Village is currently dealing with some vandalism, neighbor on neighbor. We are hopeful in most cases this can be resolved peacefully. Please try to communicate before you bring a complaint to the office. If your best

It will be a learning curve for us in general as lot owners will have to separate out the recycles, putting can's in one bin, cardboard in another etc. I will keep everyone updated. No worries! We are NOT planning to do away with recycle.

Respect your Community and Follow the Law:

The office has received many complaints the last few months regarding dogs and the rules surrounding them in public. Although I can't quote all of the rules from Florence City code title 6 chapter 6, here are a few regarding homeowner inquiries and complaints. 1) All solid waste must be picked up promptly and completely. 2) All dogs must always be on a leash no longer than 6 feet if the animal is outside your private residence or vehicle. This rule applies to all of Lane County, not just CV. 3) An animal is a nuisance if it disturbs any person by frequent or prolonged noises. Copies of the Animal control code are available online at the City of Florence website or a copy may be provided at the CV office. Complaints must be submitted using the Complaint Form available on the CV Website or they can be found in the Club House. Additionally, issues concerning dogs or other animals can also be directed to the Florence Code Enforcement Officer @ 541-902- 2180

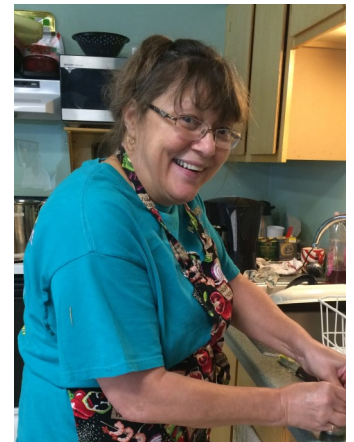

WALK ABOUT SOUP

Here's what you need for this creamy onion soup:

Sweet Yellow Onions—4 nice size sweet onions

Butter—3 Tablespoons

Chicken Broth—4 cups

Salt and Pepper

Chicken Bouillon Cubes to taste

All-purpose Flour 3 Tablespoons

Milk—2 cups

Velveeta Cheese—1 cup grated

I like to use Walla onions, but if you can't find them you could use 1015 onions or any other kind of sweet onion. I find that white onions also work well for this recipe.



HOW TO MAKE OUTBACK WALKABOUT SOUP

1. In a medium-sized saucepan, place butter and sliced onions. Cook at low to medium heat, stirring frequently until onions are soft and clear but not brown.
2. Add chicken broth, chicken bouillon cubes, salt, and pepper. Stir until completely heated through.
3. In a small saucepan, melt butter and add flour. Cook on medium heat until the flour turns thick and comes away from the side of the saucepan.
4. Pour milk into the flour mixture a little at a time and stir constantly. Add salt.
5. Continue to stir constantly until the mixture thickens and becomes like thick pudding.
6. Remove from heat and set aside until ready to use for the soup.
7. Add thickened flour mixture (white sauce) and Velveeta cheese to the onion-broth mixture.
8. Simmer on medium-low heat until the cheese is melted and all ingredients are blended, stirring constantly.

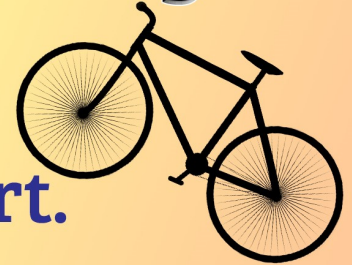
Turn temperature to warm and let cook for an additional 30 to 45 minutes.

Penny Wise and Pound Foolish

In the August newsletter, Roger Emigh invited further discussion about recycling at Coast Village. In case you missed the annual meeting, Carlla and a couple of other residents proposed to discontinue or reduce recycling here because of increased costs. This was voted down at the annual meeting.

Roger mentioned in his article that one suggestion made at the meeting was to separate cardboard from the other recyclables and “deal with it ourselves,” meaning that we would all have to “deal with” our own cardboard wastes. This was part of what was rejected. I don’t understand why this zombie idea is being revived after being voted down.

Let’s talk about what “dealing with” our cardboard would mean. Here are our choices:

Each one of us would pile up our cardboard in that big extra dry space we all have somewhere on our tiny lots, until we have enough accumulated to justify a trip to the dump.

Every lot owner would be responsible for driving his or her cardboard to the landfill as needed. No car? Oops. I guess you’ll just have to pay someone to take it for you. Would they do it for the dollar per week that each lot saves? Doubt it would even pay for the gasoline, honestly.

Just put the cardboard in with the rest of the trash which, I suspect, is what 90% of our residents would actually end up doing. In that case, how much would our regular trash bill go up?

If you add all your cardboard to your trash, you may end up with more than one can, which means you can be charged (fined) for having too much trash.

Another person at the meeting said that landfill personnel sort recyclables from mixed trash anyway, so why should we pay for recycling? My husband is a Master Recycler, and during training his class visited a large waste management site outside of Eugene. He says that indeed they do have people pulling recyclables out of the trash, but much of what might otherwise be recycled cannot be because it’s contaminated with food and other waste. Imagine being the person having to sort through hundreds of thousands of bags of dog poop, cat litter, diapers, broken glass, cans half-full of stale beer or soda, food scraps, home-generated medical waste, etc.! Presumably the County is paying people to sort this stuff. The more that we community-minded citizens do the sorting at the source (our homes), the less has to be done at the landfill. *That’s why they encourage sorting.* And don’t forget, the county also has to pay to develop more landfill space every time the landfill overflows. When that happens, of course, people complain about their taxes going up.

At the meeting another Coast Village member spoke with disdain about residents who “order everything from Amazon,” using the recycling bins to dispose of their cardboard. Well, yes. There are people here (and elsewhere) who order a lot of stuff online, for whatever reason. Some enjoy the convenience, some have no vehicle, some are infirm and cannot go shopping on their own. I’m kind of in-between. I like going to stores, but I also order things online that I cannot get in Florence – and there are a lot of things one can’t get here! No one in Florence stocks my favorite mouthwash and hand soap. Many items have seriously jacked-up prices locally. For example, recently I had to replace the big power cord that goes from the power box to my trailer. The local RV places did not have it in stock, and one guy told me he could order one for about \$500. I got one on Amazon (delivered in two days) for \$129. I recycled the box.

In Coast Village we pay for lots of things that the majority of residents do not use. Many residents never use the kitchen or showers in the community building, but a few use them all the time. We all pay. The pool is a

prime example of a very expensive amenity – maybe 30, 35 residents use the pool regularly – but we all pay for its operation, maintenance and repairs. That’s what community is all about. And we are also part of the larger community of Lane County that must dispose of our garbage. We pay for that, but the cost is hidden in our county tax bills.

Nearly everyone uses the recycling bins in Coast Village and, according to Roger, it costs each lot \$4 a month, or about a dollar a week, to recycle. Why burden everyone with having to dispose of their own cardboard? To use an overused comparison – for less than the price of a latte each month (or the price of a large bag of chips, if you prefer), we don’t have to “deal with” driving to the landfill to dispose of our cardboard, which would probably cost at least a dollar in gasoline for each trip, for those of us who are able to drive. And what is our time worth?

Glenn Singley made what I thought was an excellent suggestion, which Roger didn’t mention as an option in his “Ramblings.” Glenn proposed buying a trailer for just cardboard and having our crew take it to the dump as needed, rather than paying a waste management company to haul it. It would not be free, but it probably wouldn’t cost as much as outsourcing the hauling, and would perhaps allow us to reduce the number of our recycle bins to one. It would also prevent a massive increase in cardboard in the Coast Village trash stream because most people will not take their own to the landfill.
